SUMMARY STATEMENT

Background: On December 13, 2011, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2011-13. This ordinance set forth procedures governing the adoption and updating of a consolidated fee schedule. Per this ordinance, all City departments are required to review the consolidated fee schedule annually and recommend proposed changes to the schedule. Proposed changes are to contain an explanation for the need for the newly proposed fees and identify any fees that may be mandated by law and any requests for deletions or increases. The City Manager shall then place on the regular agenda of the City Council at least annually an action item and public hearing on the fee schedule.

Publication on the City's internet site of proposed fee changes shall take place at least 60 days prior to adoption of any new fees or increases. The proposed changes to the consolidated fee schedule have been published on the City's website since September 20, 2018. The proposed revisions to the consolidated fee schedule are set forth in the resolution submitted with this agenda bill. These revisions include the following:

City Clerk's Office

- a) Change in the fee for New Liquor License Applications from \$50 to \$150. Fee is inadequate to cover costs of review by staff. Average for area cities is \$249.16. Average for Phoenix area is \$854.97. This is a one-time fee to the City.
- b) Liquor License Modifications is a new category, but the fee remains the same.

Finance Department

- a) New Business License Fee increases from \$50 to \$70 which represents 100% cost recovery.
- b) Annual Renewal Business License Fee increases from \$25 to \$35 which represents 100% cost recovery.
- c) Special Event Business License Fee increases from \$7 to \$10 which represents 100% cost recovery.

Parks & Recreation Department:

- a) New \$30 fee for 1-week swim lesson session with 4, 45-minute classes is proposed. Shorter commitment for families planning vacations.
- b) Various fees and categories related to the Posse Grounds Hub are proposed as shown on the schedule. These fees are based on current customer expectations and fair market value. Customer feedback was considered and incorporated where possible.

Wastewater Department:

- a) This reflects an increase of 3.19% for capacity fees which is based on the Engineering News Construction Cost Inflation Factor increase from January 2017 to January 2018 as recommended in the wastewater rate study.
- b) Categories were also added and or revised.

SUMMARY STATEMENT

<u>Background:</u> This is a housekeeping item to add clarification to the City Code that residential rentals of real property are exempt from the business license requirement.

The current language in Section 5.05.010 (Definitions – Casual Activity or Sale) is as follows:

5.05.010 Definitions.

"Casual activity or sale" means a single or incidental transaction of an isolated nature made by a person who neither represents himself to be nor is engaged in a business subject to a license fee imposed by this chapter. The sale, rental, license for use, or lease transaction concerning real property shall not be treated, or be exempt, as casual... (Emphasis added).

A.R.S. § 9-1304(B) prohibits business licenses for residential rentals. This action to revise the definition of "casual activity or sale" and delete the sentence referenced in bold lettering above to bring the City Code into compliance with state statutes.

"The sale, rental, license for use, or lease transaction concerning real property shall not be treated, or be exempt, as casual."

Section 2. Savings Clause

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance.

Section 3. Repeal

All other code provisions, ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict as of the effective date hereof.
