# 2021 CITY OF SEDONA SUSTAINABILITY REVIEW



### **CLIMATE ACTION PLAN**

The City adopted its first Climate Action Plan (CAP) in July. The CAP sets a goal of reducing community-wide emissions by 50% by the year 2030 through 50 actionable items.



#### **GREEN FLEET POLICY**

The City created and adopted a Green Fleet Policy in November. The policy prioritizes electric fleet purchases and aims for a completely zero-emissions light duty fleet by 2030.

# **NEW STAFF**

2 The City added two new Sustainability Program staff this year. With additional staff capacity, the City will be able to launch even more sustainability initiatives.





# HAZARDOUS WASTE DIVERTED

24,338 LBS 12,900 lbs. of hazardous waste and 11,438 lbs. of electronics were diverted from the landfill at our household hazardous waste collection event.

#### HYDRATION STATIONS

Additional water bottle refill station was installed at Posse Grounds Park. Additional refill stations have been purchased to be installed Uptown in 2022.



### **BIKE PATHS AND SIDEWALKS**

The City's Public Works Department finished construction of a one mile shared-use path along Thunder Mountain Road and Sanborn Drive. This promotes active, low-carbon travel.





# **ELECTRIC CAR CHARGING**

The City installed two new electric vehicle charging stations in Uptown. We also secured a grant from APS to build four chargers at Sunset Park in 2022.

### HOLIDAY EVENTS

The City has reduced food waste at events like Breakfast with Santa by offering composting. Additionally, events like the Pumpkin Drop made it easier to compost jack-o-lanterns.





### LOW WATER GARDEN

City staff and Yavapai County Master Gardeners collaborated to build two demonstration gardens at City Hall that use drought-resistant plants that attract pollinators.

#### SOLAR CO-OP

The City partnered with Solar United Neighbors, the City of Flagstaff, and Coconino County to save residents money on solar installations through the Northern Arizona Solar Co-op.





# WATERSHED CLEANUPS

425 LBS In partnership with the Oak Creek Watershed Council, 425 lbs of trash was removed from watershed drainages across Sedona.
