## FISCAL YEAR 2022 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

### INTRODUCTION BY CHERIE R. WRIGHT, CPA, CGFM, DIRECTOR OF FINANCIAL SERVICES

The fiscal year (FY) 2022 budget represents a return to a "new normal" standard for City operations after a year of uncertainty and scaling back due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Financial resources have been allocated to advance initiatives in the voter-approved Community Plan such as the affordable housing program, the environmental sustainability program, strategic property acquisition to help protect Sedona's unique character, implementation of a public transit system, and continuation of traffic improvement projects.

Looking back to the FY 2021 budget, it was essentially adopted as a "hold-the-line" budget with the threat of possible financial impacts to City operations due to the anticipated COVID-19 financial crisis. In addition, much of the FY 2021 budget was frozen until mid-October awaiting the impact of a possible "second wave" of COVID closures that never happened.

While many areas across the U.S. have suffered significant financial losses as a result of the COVID impacts, Sedona has not seen the same. In fact, FY 2021 sales and bed tax revenues have well exceeded any prior year, resulting in \$14 million more revenue than was projected.

Sedona has a long history of budgeting less than is statutorily allowed. This is not always the case with other local governments across Arizona. Many struggle with how to allocate limited resources to maintain services and make improvements within their communities, resulting in adopting budgets at the maximum level allowed.

The FY 2021 increase in revenue, as well as projected increases for FY 2022, result in an estimated total surplus for FY 2022 of \$37 million.

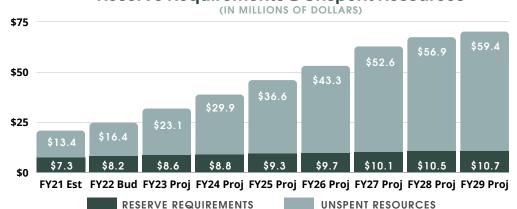

# HOW THE BUDGET ALIGNS WITH THE COMMUNITY PLAN

The Sedona Community Plan was approved by the voters in 2014 and represents the citizens' vision and values for the community and proposes desired conditions for the future. City Council has included funding in the FY 2022 budget to pursue numerous Community Plan goals including the following:

## AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROGRAM

**BUDGETED AMOUNT** 



Between a combination of accumulated balances for affordable housing and stimulus funding from the American Rescue Plan Act of \$1.7 million, \$4 million has been budgeted for the affordable housing program, including \$2.1 million toward the development of a 46-unit workforce housing apartment complex – representing a total increase of \$3 million over FY 2021.

## ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM

**BUDGETED AMOUNT** 



Enhancement of the environmental sustainability program, including an annual curbside yard waste pickup program and energy retrofit and rebate programs, is budgeted as a \$500,000 increase resulting in a FY 2022 budget amount of \$900,000.

#### **PUBLIC TRANSIT SYSTEM**

**BUDGETED AMOUNT** 



Initiation of a public transit system, starting with trailhead shuttles and a microtransit pilot project for an app-enabled on-demand public transportation service, is budgeted at \$3 million.

## STRATEGIC PROPERTY ACQUISITION

**BUDGETED AMOUNT** 



Strategic property acquisition of \$1.9 million has been added to the budget to better manage how property is developed within the expectations of maintaining the community character and facilitating the advancement of initiatives in the Community Plan. Of the total \$4 million General Fund surplus allocated, \$2.1 million was used in FY 2021. Council may still consider up to \$4 million in property acquisition for FY 2022 by transferring budget appropriation, possibly from the housing program.

#### TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS

BUDGETED AMOUNT



The budgeted increase for traffic improvement projects, known as Sedona in Motion, is \$3 million resulting in a FY 2022 budget amount of \$9 million, including a Forest Road bypass connection to SR89A, a pedestrian crossing on Oak Creek at SR179, and additional parking at Posse Grounds Park combined with a shared-use path along Soldiers Pass Road.

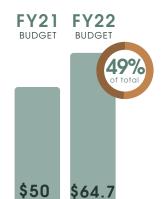

# WHAT DOES IT COST TO RUN THE CITY AND HOW ARE THOSE COSTS PAID?

The total FY 2022 expenditure budget is \$62.7 million, an increase of \$11.5 million or 22%. In addition, the FY 2022 budget includes a debt refinancing of \$9 million, resulting in a total budget amount of \$71.7 million. The debt refinancing is anticipated to reduce interest costs by \$732,000.

## What financial resources are available for the City of Sedona?

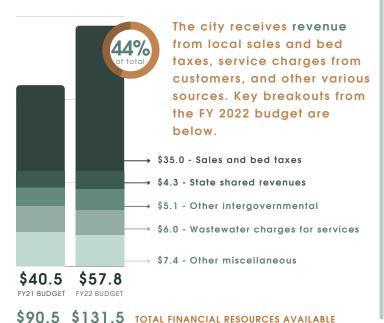
(IN MILLIONS OF DOLLARS)

FY21 BUDGET

The city's financial statements are audited annually by an independent auditor. The most recent audit for FY 2020 received a clean opinion.
