

DISC GOLF RULES

Disc Golf rules are easy to learn. How you play is similar to traditional golf, but with disc golf discs instead of balls and clubs.

Objective of the Game

Like traditional golf, one throw (stroke) is counted each time the disc is thrown and when a penalty is incurred. The goal is to play each hole in the fewest strokes possible. The player with the lowest total strokes for the entire course wins. The hole is completed when the disc comes to rest in a disc golf basket. We recommend using the UDisc App for scoring and tracking along the course!

Safety First

Never throw when players or other park users are within range. Always give park users the right of way. Be aware of your surroundings and environment at all times.

Tee Throws

Each hole begins with a tee throw. Tee throws must be completed within or behind the designated tee

The Lie

The lie is the spot where the player's previous throw has landed. Leave the thrown disc on the ground where it landed to mark a lie. The player's subsequent throw is made from directly behind the marked lie. Discs that are unplayable due to cacti, bushes, etc. should be played behind the obstacle. To obtain relief, mark a new lie that is on the line of play at the nearest point that safely provides relief.

Throwing Order

The player with the least amount of strokes on the previous hole is the first to tee off on the next hole. After all players have teed off, the player whose disc is farthest from the hole always throws first.

Fairway Throws


Fairway throws must be made from directly behind the lie. A run-up and normal follow-through after release is allowed, unless the lie is within 10 meters of the target. Any shot within 10 meters of the target requires that the player maintain balance and not move past the lie until the disc comes to

Completion Of Hole

A disc that comes to rest in the disc golf basket or suspended in the chains constitutes the successful completion of that hole.

Out Of Bounds

If any area of O.B. is visible between the disc and O.B. line, then the disc is considered O.B. A throw that lands out of bounds must be played from a point up to 1 meter in bounds from where the disc crossed over the out-of-bounds line. Permanent water hazards, public roads, and most park boundaries are almost always out of bounds. Discs that land in school or homeowner property are not retrievable and are to be left in place. Please respect the school and homeowner property boundaries.

COURSE RULES

Respect the boundaries of the course and any out-of-bounds areas of neighboring properties. Do not enter school or private resident property to retrieve a disc. If your disc lands out-of-bounds, proceed according to the established rules for penalty and placement.

Pack it in and pack it out. Please throw all trash in containers near hole 1. Leave the course cleaner than you found it.

You're playing in a beautiful, serene place. Please keep noise levels to a minimum to avoid disturbing other park users and residents living near the course. Show respect for the natural beauty of the area and the local environment. Stay on marked paths and avoid damaging vegetation.

The course is open from sunrise to sunset.
